The Policy Subcommittee reviewed VIMS practices for hiring faculty to see whether improvements could be made to increase diversity. Our committee is working with the administration to make slight revisions of institutional practices to be implemented for the current round of hiring five new faculty members. Some changes include advertising the positions more broadly than we have in the past, asking applicants to comment on their commitment to diversity, including a longer preferred W&M Equal Opportunity tag line on the advertisement, and having interviewees meet with Sharron Gatling so that she can answer any confidential questions. Our subcommittee is also analyzing prior VIMS hiring data to determine where minority candidates are missed or being dropped.

100 Years of Women

In the fall of 1918, 24 women were admitted as undergraduate students at William & Mary, making W&M the first public coeducational university in Virginia. The men of the Class of 1918 lamented that they would be "the last class to graduate from the old college before it is defiled by coeducation."



The Virginia Gazette editorialized that the admission of women had come "at the price of the womanhood Virginia had cherished as a sacred thing."

The women of 1918 began at once to change the university. Excluded at first from participating in most existing activities, the women initiated intramural athletic competitions and organized a Women's Student Government. They were not afraid to be "the first" or to advocate for themselves.

Today, women represent 58% of the students at William & Mary.

At VIMS, the story is slightly different. With the 2018 class, 65% of students were female, and 31% of faculty. Although there has been fluctuation in enrollment, there has been a steady trend towards an increasing presence of women in all roles across campus.

VIMS has awarded ~300 Masters degrees and ~100 PhDs to women since opening its doors to students in 1940.
